Object Based Research 1

- 1. Give a thorough description of what you see. At this point do not try to provide interpretation or meaning. Just say what you see.
 - a. (Example: What appears to be a man is sitting with his legs crossed. It looks like he's sitting on a pillow-like throne. There's a round red back to the throne and some flower pedals around the bottom. He has a crown made of human heads and there are other heads making a kind of necklace around his upper body. He is very black with a red mouth and has 8 arms and in each hand he is holding something different. There appears to be a flower coming up from the heads. The background is a landscape with mountains. It looks like a painting.)
- 2. Identify each as to title, time period, culture, belief system (these are usually located on the site with the image).
- 3. Do the research on your site (dig deep) to discuss the piece mentioning things like:
 - a. Subject of work. Identify the persons if there are people.
 - b. Source for the imagery. (Is it from one of the texts? If so, which one? What is the story that is being represented?)
 - c. How can we identify the figures in the work? Do they have certain attributes? What are they and how do they tell us who this person is?
 - d. Other information discussed on the site.
