

## Instructions for Student Presentations

1. Choose one topic to research and present to the class. Class participation is important.
2. To begin, search for information on your topic. Do enough research to decide how best to explain your topic.
3. Write in outline form or essay form what you have discovered. All students should have a list of the most important points that we can post on the website. Bring them to class and email to me in digital form.
4. You do not have to do a Power point. In fact, it is only necessary if you have images to present. I'm not a fan of a power point that just has text that says what you say.
5. If you show images make sure you can speak about the images you show. **Don't show images just because you found them.**

These student presentations are designed to provide context for the artwork or stories we are looking at in class. All art and literature is developed in a context. Your presentations are to add context. You don't have to link your topic to art or literature.

**So remember: use legitimate sites or books for research; write a clear and concise presentation; make a list of the most important points to share; know what you are talking about.**
